flowers.

Diane's work has also been shown in art shows at Worcester State University. She lives in New York City.

Chris Chalfant



Chris Chalfant is a composer, pianist, vocalist, poet, and visual artist. Studies include a BA in Music with a focus in piano at Kent State with Margaret Baxtresser, Eurhythmics at Longy School of Music with Anne Farber, Jazz with Connie Crothers and an MM from New England Conservatory, with a focus on jazz, composition, non-western and aleatoric music. Her mentor was George Russell.

Recordings as producer, composer and pianist include "Book of Unstandards," "Love and Light," "Convergence" with

Noah Howard Quartet, "New'd Music" with Dennis Warren and, "All in Good Time" with the Chris Chalfant Trio. The multimedia piece "Looking Through Trees" was premiered at Irondale Theatre in Brooklyn, NY in 2010. Prior incarnations of LTT included a painted paper sculpture, a trio improvisation at Chelsea Museum and a film with live improvisation ensemble at University of Denver. Chalfant co-led the Dojo Band and Lifetime Visions Orchestra with Joseph Jarman which featured her works frequently.

Chris Chalfant's work has been featured in Nancy Jazz Pulsations and Vision Festivals, Prague Jazzového Mezinárodní Piana, on Czech National Radio, at International Society of Improvised Music (ISIM) Conferences, the Leukerbad (Switzerland) International Composers Conference and in residencies at Atlantic Center with Joan LaBarbara and Morton Subotnick, Bard College of Music Jazz program, and Music Omi International.

Collections of original compositions include *Book of Unstandards* and *First Performances*. Other works may be found in *Notations 21* by Theresa Sauer, *Silent Solos Improvisers Speak*, (Buddy's Knife,) "Encyclopedia of the 21st Century," (Maximillien de Lafayette, editor) and *Jazz Improv* Magazine.

Chalfant studied art and music in Akron, Ohio where she was presented in a city-wide art show at age 14 and where she co-curated an interactive art exhibit at age 16 with the Akron Art Institute (now Museum.) Chalfant won second place for two compositions in a city-wide competition. After moving to the East Coast, Chris Chalfant delved into multi-genre collaborations with artists, dancers and poets. In 1990 Chris Chalfant was the merit finalist for "A Portrait of Three Portraits" in a national competition out of Louisville, Kentucky.

While her visual art took a back seat to music for years, Chris Chalfant got back into visual art through photography. Her most recent nature photography has been the result of the need to connect to the ongoing unfolding of life during the time of Covid. Chalfant's work has been shown numerous times at Marble Collegiate Church and at Blue Door Art Center where she won Best of Show for "Red Rose."

Always passionate to create - her love of painting began with childhood finger painting right through block carving linocuts into prints in high school. Continuing in New York City at Hunter College, Supermud Pottery Studios, Parsons School of Design and at The Art Students League (currently on Zoom and live); her multifaceted skills directed her toward exhibiting in galleries and to selling artworks.

Karen, a semi-realist and abstract visionary artist feels that more than almost anything painting fulfills her- it's her nature to paint.

She comes from a creative family. Her dad worked as a motion picture projectionist and a part time electrician before high tech

became popular; and he loved playing the violin accompanied by his nephew(cello) and his sister(piano). To boot Karen's mom wrote poetry and loved playing violin as well. Karen's two sisters are both talented actresses who have achieved a fair share of fame.

Karen feels that in today's world being an artist requires an extensive span of learning: classes, reading, questioning and re-evaluating. She considers herself to be an "eclectic", an inventor of the fantastic and a dreamer delving into the unknown. She has branched out into these themes which focus mainly on using bright colors, fantasy, flat surfaces and spontaneous natural backgrounds.

In this summer's "Fun Festival" Karen has chosen three large works from her select repertoire. The first, "Picnic on the Hudson," acrylic, displays a favorite theme - river entertainment - folks steering sailboats, healthy bicyclists and a family picnic gathering.

Karen's second choice canvas, "Summer Festival" is a collage assemblage of swirling objects, flying mating birds and reminders of fun in the sun - portions of ocean views, beaches and nostalgic remnants that light up ones' spirit and beingness.

A quite remarkable third acrylic painting "Mountain Bird" will transport you to another dimension. It's a mystical landscape, a solid rocky mountain with a magically endowed waterfall. This curious red bird has discovered her quiet place and serenity - allowing her a sacred dip into nature's healing natural rejuvenator - fresh rocks water!

As a self-taught artist, with a wide range of skills and talents, she creates fine line complex, harmonious, geometric drawings, paintings, sculptures, photography; her videos often include her music. She works in both analogue and digital media. As a fine artist, Pepe's foundation for her images is her free hand unique style sacred geometric drawings and paintings. She is also adept using computer art programs. She lives and creates in Manhattan and is founder of LuminSonics Inc. Her music (known as Pepe LuminSonics) is in worldwide distribution.

Pepe's drawings, paintings, photos, animations and multimedia productions have been exhibited nationally, including shows in New York, New Jersey, Philadelphia and

California. Victoria has exhibited in venues and galleries such as The Ballet Shop and Gallery Lincoln Center; Metropolitan Opera Gift Shop; Long Island Arts Festival; The Audio-Video and Film Festival Gallery X; Gallery 49; Digital Bridges at the Westbeth Gallery Digital Arts Video Show; The Godseye Exhibit; Artexpo at the Javits Center; The Visionary Arts Festival at The Palace of Fine Arts San Francisco; The Arts Renewal Program and The Film/Video Showcase at the Marble Collegiate Arts Showcases. As an accomplished composer, she creates the music that accompanies many of her art/music videos. She also composed music for educational and documentary videos: The Philadelphia Museum of Art, The University of the Arts, Pa., The Philadelphia School, The McKinney Gallery, Pa. Victoria has professional experience in design, theater and media for: Vivian Beaumont Theater, Lincoln Center, scenic design; Metropolitan Opera Gift Shop, designed gifts at Lincoln Center; Westbury Music Fair, Long Island, props and properties; AIS (J. Walter Thompson) TV quality and content control. As a photographer she has exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art, Life of the City; Our Flag, Grace Gallery; and the Ritz Broadway Window Photo Exhibit, NYC. Victoria is a long- time grateful member of the Marble Arts Ministry and is creating the ongoing Virtual Reality Art gallery presentations.

Her sculptures have been shown at Roger LaPelle Galleries, Philadelphia. Pepe's art is also in and private studios and showcases.

Considered a truly multidisciplinary visionary artist, Pepe's lifelong spiritual quest forms a foundation for her artistic expressions and concepts. Concerning her art and music she states, "Creating connects me to something beyond myself. It is a meditation and a timeless place of profound peace and transcendence. I connect to a higher Source which creates through me. It is hoped that this transcendent transformative energy is conveyed to those who view and hear my work." In the Philadelphia City Paper art review of Pepe's virtual video painting on exhibit at the LG Tripp Gallery, Robin Rice writes that her video art is "a truly artful night light". Victoria hopes her creative expressions help spread the Light.

For the Marble Arts VR Pop Up Gallery "Summer Joy" 2021, Victoria presents 'Flowers of Light", a fine art print 11x14 POD. They are flowers of another light dimension, that can be seen when one is filled with joy in this dimension. These flowers unify the idea in two dimensions, creating an augmented type of reality. As a photographer, Victoria also shares some of her summer joys with two photo collages 14x14 POD. Each piece is comprised of 4 photos expressing energy and joy of the summer that she experiences when she walks in Riverside Park, NYC. The dog run/park is fun to watch. The dogs play together and enjoy their time in the water bin; this is shown in the collage "Delight at the Dog Park Water Bin." The dogs line up and enter their joyful summer experience. Victoria also presents photos showing how enjoyable it is to watch the people practice with their skateboards, and achieve their goals in "Achieving a Skateboard Flip" These photos capture the action of these experiences.
